Introduction

This year marks 30 years since the Chernobyl nuclear reactor explosion, on April 26, 1986 in Ukraine, that spewed radioactive particles across the world. It also marks five years since the March 11, 2011 Fukushima nuclear disaster began in Japan. The effects of both these catastrophes are still being felt today, in the human populations exposed and by animal species and their habitats. These lessons cannot be forgotten or ignored. Leading scientists, medical personnel and policy experts will present their findings on the health and environmental impacts of Chernobyl and Fukushima. The panelists will also discuss efforts in the U.S. to downplay or ignore these lessons, leaving the country ill-prepared for a nuclear disaster of its own.

Another farmer, Kenji Hasegawa, also speaks critically of the flawed evacuation efforts during the Fukushima meltdowns.

Sharapova's mother was pregnant with her at the time of the Chernobyl explosion. The family moved to Siberia before she was born, but through her charitable work she supports other "survivors" of Chernobyl.
